Hand-on Session

Facilitator Anna De Liddo

What concepts from different disciplines can inform the design of tools and practices of Cl4CG? What research and civic venues, events, organizations, conferences should we approach?

We'll stick on the Wall 2 flipchart papers as collective canvas. Then we'll ask each participant to:
1) Think at disciplines/concepts relevant to CI4CG, and write them on a sticky note. Then we'll ask to stick the notes on the wall and cluster them so that proximity expresses similarity of concepts/disciplines.
2) Locate yourself: Stick a sticky-label around the post-it to vote what discipline represents you more (you have got max 3 sticky votes)

3) Target Venues – Conferences: What conferences/venues can you suggest for specific disciplines? Write conference/networks/ civic venues/events on post it, stick them to the wall and use a pen to draw a line connecting the venue to the topics it covers.

At the end of this hands-on session we'll get a list of disciplines clustered by proximity, we'll know who are the experts on these disciplines who are already part of our network, and we'll see what potential venues and conferences we should target for CI4CG events.
